On behalf of Leon County Government, I am excited to present Leon County’s Essential Libraries Initiative (ELI). The ELI re-envision’s County libraries to better serve our community’s changing needs both now and in the future. According to the Aspen Institute, libraries are no longer book warehouses. We used this input to align our priorities with the needs of the community to ensure continued relevance of County libraries. The plan you are now holding serves as a road map to grow that relevance in many different ways.

From engaging programming to facility enhancements, citizens can already see the ELI being implemented throughout our Library System. And as we plan for the future, we will continue to engage our citizens in transforming County libraries into centers of learning, engagement, and innovation.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Leon County Public Library System's Essential Libraries Initiative is a strategic plan that re-envisioned the Library to address the changing needs of residents and trends in library use. Approved by the Leon County Board of County Commissioners in June 2021, the initiative contains refocused priorities and action items to implement enhancements to the Library's offerings. Over the last two years, the Library has undergone an extensive re-envisioning process that includes identifying the changing roles of public libraries, refocusing priorities on the needs of the community, and engaging citizens to help develop new strategies to maintain relevance. Consequently, a major component of the Essential Libraries Initiative is developing new programs that are representative of and appealing to Leon County's diverse population. The action items proposed as part of the initiative will be implemented over the next three years. The four focus areas of the Library guide the development of all new programs and services that will be offered as part of the Essential Libraries Initiative:

- » Literacy and Lifelong Learning
- » Business and Workforce Development
- » Civic and Community Engagement
- » Arts and Humanities

Each focus area includes specific priorities which will be achieved by implementing their respective action items. Although the Library will be developing and ensuring the completion of the action items, support from work areas, such as the Office of Sustainability, the Office of Economic Vitality, and Parks and Recreation, and partnerships with local institutions and community organizations will be vital to the success of the initiative.

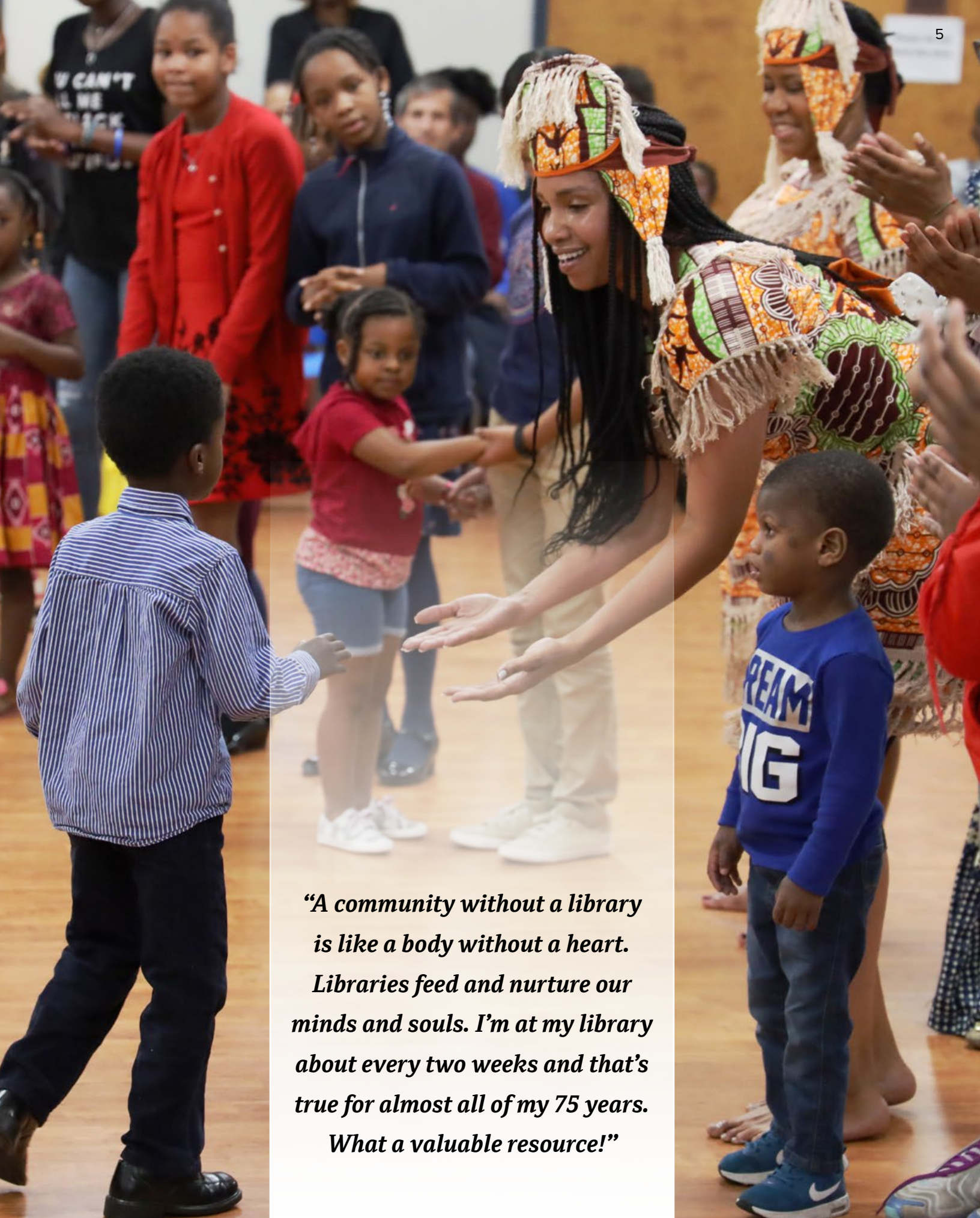

LITERACY AND LIFELONG LEARNING

To serve as a resource in developing the skills needed to be successful socially, intellectually, financially, and technologically at any age by promoting traditional and non-traditional forms of literacy. (L)

	<i>Priority</i>	<i>Initial Action Item</i>
L1	Champion adult and youth literacy as the foundation for learning and discovery.	Increase youth literacy resources by providing additional staff training, curating a collection of books, games, and other materials to help children practice reading at home, and offering summer reading skills camps.
L2	Provide technology training for all ages to ensure a digitally literate community.	Offer free basic and intermediate digital literacy training programs with opportunities for certification.
L3	Support lifelong education for seniors and retirees with programs that entertain, educate, and provide connections to community resources.	Partner with local organizations to develop workshops and events focused on mental health and financial topics that will serve both seniors and their caregivers.
L4	Develop early learning resources for parents and guardians to teach their children the skills they need to succeed in school.	Develop kindergarten readiness workshops and programs to help young children and their caregivers prepare for school.
L5	Support K-12 students in developing core academic and learning success skills: literacy, problem solving, creativity and innovation, teamwork and collaboration, and communication.	Continue to offer the Homework Hub program where K-8 students can participate in one-on-one tutoring, homework help clinics, and demonstrations of the Library's online studying tools.





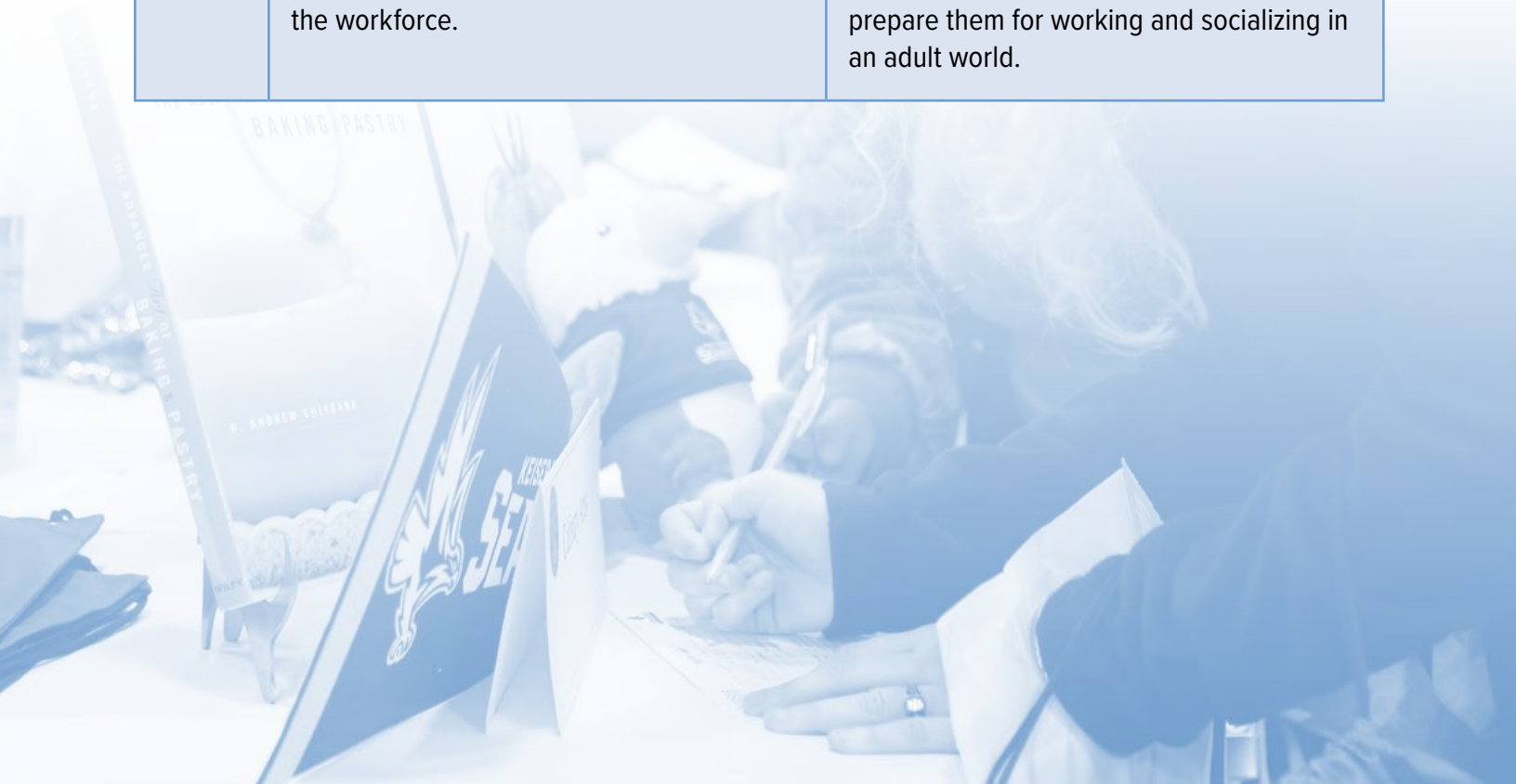

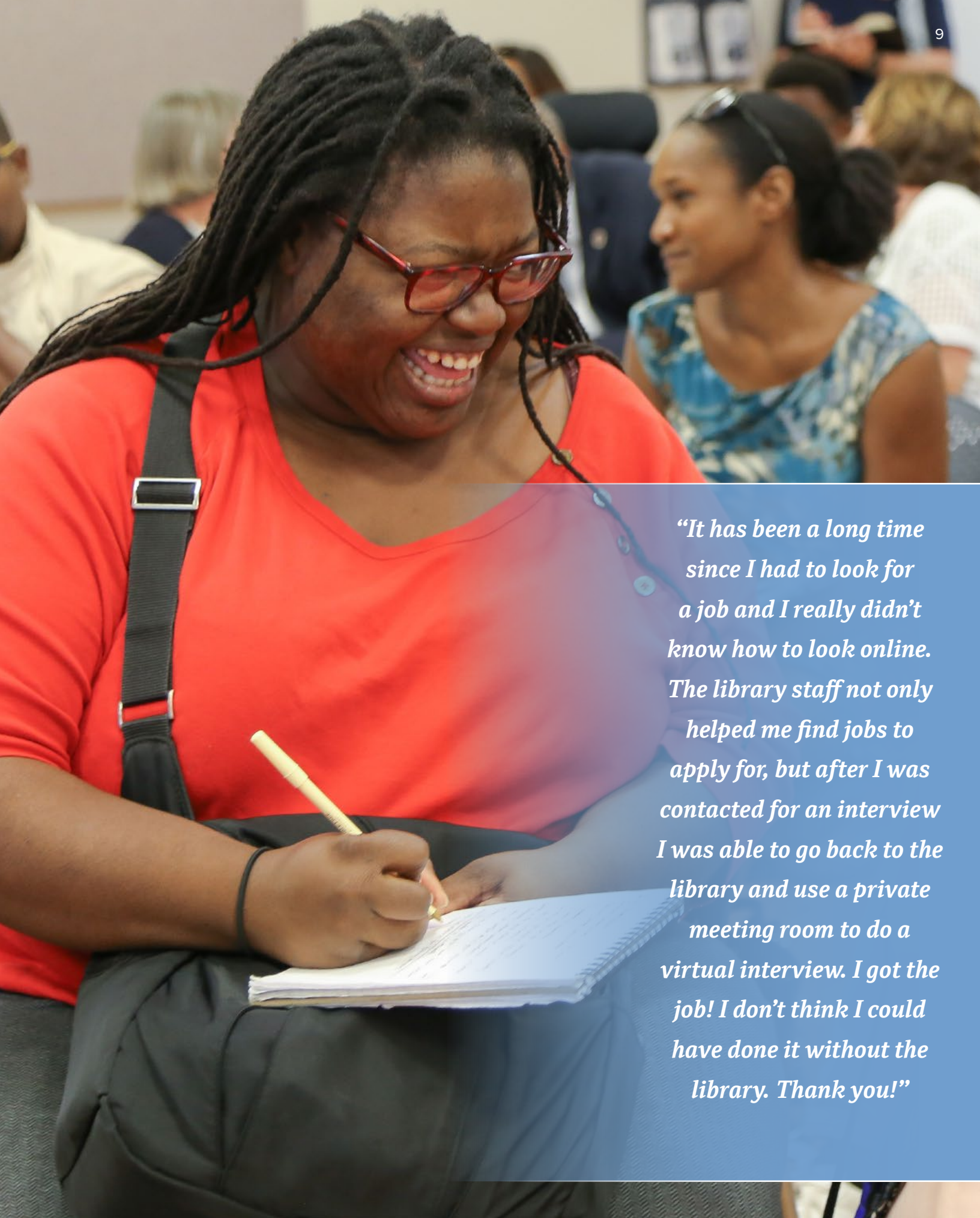


FOCUS AREA BUSINESS AND WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

To support a strong local economy by acting as a resource for businesses and individuals seeking professional development. (B)

	<i>Priority</i>	<i>Initial Action Item</i>
B1	Collaborate with the Tallahassee-Leon County Office of Economic Vitality to provide resources and spaces that support local businesses and entrepreneurs.	Improve and expand coworking spaces and create new conference and meeting rooms for entrepreneurs, small business owners, and telecommuters.
B2	Provide programs that develop skillsets needed to build a thriving workforce.	Develop programs and activities with local partners to introduce youth to possible STEM career fields.
B3	Offer resources for job seekers and those transitioning to new careers.	Support parent jobseekers struggling to find or afford childcare by offering Storytime and other activities during job fairs.
B4	Provide opportunities for teens to develop leadership and life skills to ready them for the workforce.	Expand programming for teens to include life-skills training and other resources to prepare them for working and socializing in an adult world.

FOCUS AREA CIVIC AND COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

To serve as a vibrant, active hub of civic discourse and participative democracy, building relationships and bridging gaps in all segments of the community. (C)

	<i>Priority</i>	<i>Initial Action Item</i>
C1	Provide opportunities to engage in civil discourse around topics that impact Leon County and are of interest to the community.	Host facilitated discussions and resources on relevant topics and issues that impact Leon County residents, including programs about voter suppression and a resource guide for having discussions about race, equality, and inclusion.
C2	Serve as a gateway to connect people with community services and government programs.	Establish a Community Resources Specialist position to provide one-on-one assistance and referrals for community services, including affordable housing, career skills training, counseling, and government services and benefits.
C3	Collaborate with local colleges and universities to maximize outcomes in areas of mutual interest.	Expand the Library's internship program so participating students will work with staff to increase outreach to local community members and offer programs outside of Library facilities.
C4	Act as a resource and partner to local nonprofit service providers in addressing community issues.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Launch a video visitation and family literacy program where children can connect with an incarcerated parent using a video kiosk at the Library. • Develop collaborative food programming with the Leon County Office of Sustainability and local partners to offer healthy cooking classes, no/low waste cooking, cooking on a budget, and cooking for those with limited access to food sources.

To support residents in their creative, intellectual, and recreational pursuits and foster cultural enrichment. (A)

	<i>Priority</i>	<i>Initial Action Item</i>
A1	Offer a diverse physical and digital collection that supports the needs and interests of the community.	Develop a Library of Things containing various items available for loan that supports the “sharing economy” and sustainability efforts and can provide low-income residents with access to much-needed resources that promote digital literacy or home improvement and maintenance.
A2	Collaborate with arts, humanities, and other creative organizations to provide programming for all ages.	Host tutorials, workshops, or clubs to teach crafting and maker skills that will help citizens develop critical thinking skills and problem-solving skills.
A3	Offer timely and relevant cultural events and classes that showcase the community’s diversity.	Celebrate cultural heritage months and other annual observations with relevant programs and displays and social media outreach that promote related books and materials in the collection.
A4	Support creativity through the Library’s collection, collaborative spaces, events, and classes.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Simplify the exhibit request process and engage with local artists, archives, colleges of art and community organizations to curate exhibits at Library locations. • Create a welcoming and relaxing environment for patrons by playing soft music.
